Benjamin Haideri and Jonathon Feinman both serve as role models to Community Call students by inspiring students to look beyond themselves and produce an event that benefits the broader community.

Executive Director Update



What an incredible year for Community Call! The 2012 – 2013 Academic year was the launch of Community Call’s Enrichment Program (CCEP) in event planning for at risk high school students in the Boston public schools. The program was taught as part of the in-school curriculum at Boston Preparatory Charter School in Hyde Park and afterschool at Boston Collegiate Charter School in Dorchester.

- In January, the Boston Preparatory students produced Beat the Street at Northeastern University to provide resources to help keep youth off the streets and partnered with the Mayor’s Youthline office, Boston Police Department, Northeastern University and over a dozen non-profits offering youth oriented programming .
- In May, the Boston Collegiate class produced Play It Forward, a Boston Community Fair for financially disadvantaged families at the Parkman Bandstand on the Boston Common on Mother’s Day weekend. The event featured games and nonprofit resources available for families. (Both events are highlighted in this newsletter and on the website at www.communitycall.org.)
- In the spring, Community Call launched the inaugural, Greater Boston Young Leader Award to recognize young social entrepreneurs between the ages of 17 and 35. There were 28 outstanding nominations submitted representing a wide variety of causes, neighborhoods, and backgrounds. A peer review committee chose two recipients and the award was presented by Josh Zakim at the Home Sweet Home VI event in September.
- In June, Community Call organized a free, small-midsize business summit at Cinquecento Trattoria, bringing best practice companies and nonprofits that coordinate “giving back” efforts with other companies looking to learn more about supporting the community.
- In September, Whole Foods in Charles River Plaza raised over \$7000 for Community Call from a 5% Day! We also held our Home Sweet Home fundraiser and presented the Community Call Young Leader Award. In addition, we were interviewed on the Gwen Blackburn Show on Kiss 108 and JAMN 94.5.
- This 2013-2014 year has renewed us at Boston Collegiate and we’ve added Fenway High School and the Re-Engagement Center in Roxbury, a pilot school to bring back disenfranchised youth to complete their high school education. All three schools are well on their way to outstanding community events for the spring of 2014.
- In November, Community Call joined the Peace Collaborative, a group of volunteers and organizations committed to reducing urban violence by engaging youth in activities and providing resources to keep young people off the streets.

We look forward to continuing to grow our partnerships with businesses, education centers, and nonprofits to improve the lives of our students while making a difference in the community!

Beat the Street: January 2013 – Northeastern U.

Beat the Street was a very successful program developed, planned and executed by students at the Boston Preparatory Charter School in Hyde Park bringing together students representing 18 Boston high schools. The event was a resource fair to provide at-risk Boston high school students with alternative programs to hanging out in the street. Co-sponsors included the Mayor's Boston Youth Zone, Northeastern University, the Boston Police Department, Rebecca's Cafe and JP Licks Ice Cream. Music and emceeing was provided by D.J. Maverik of JAMN 94.5. Presenting organizations included Girls LEAP, Project Hip Hop, the Mayor's Youthline, Boston Navigator, Suffolk County Sheriff's Department for Youth, Samarateen, Teen Empowerment, Future Chefs, Louis D. Brown Peace Institute, Community Music Center Boston, Mayor's Youth Leadership Council and more with an engaging panel discussion with the students on urban violence.
